Explanations/Hints and tips

Week 1 - words ending in able/ably

Use -able/ably ending if there is a related word in the 'family' which can take the ending -ation as well, e.g. adorable/adorably (adoration), applicable/applicably (application). The -able/-ably ending is more common than -ible/-ibly endings.

If the -able ending is added to a word ending in -ce or -ge, the e after the c or g must be kept as those letters would otherwise have their 'hard' sounds (as in cap and gap) before the a of the -able ending.

Also, the -able ending is usually, but not always, used if a complete root word can be heard before it (e.g. comfort = comfortable), even if there is no related word ending in -ation. In reliable, the complete word rely is heard, but the y changes to i in accordance with the rule.

Week 3 - words ending in ible/ibly

The -ible/-ibly ending is common if a complete root word can't be heard before it but it also sometimes occurs when a complete word can be heard (e.g. sense - sensible, sensibly).

Week 4 - Spelling challenge words

Week 5 - Adding suffixes beginning with vowel letters to words ending in -fer

-look carefully at whether the r is doubled

When adding a suffix which begins with a vowel letter (e.g. -ing, -ed, -al) to a word ending in -fer, the r is doubled if the -fer is still stressed (pronounced more strongly).

The r is not doubled if the -fer is no longer stressed.

The double consonant ff usually means the r does not need to be doubled.
