Explanations/Hints and tips

Over this half term

Homophones and other words that are often confused. Look up the two meanings if you don't know them!

For the first five pairs, the pairs of words are easily mixed up when using them in context. The noun version ends in -ce and the verb version ends in -se. Advice and advise provide a useful clue as the word advise (verb) is pronounced with a /z/ sound - which could not be spelt c. Prophecy is a noun and prophesy is a verb.

Children should know meanings as well as spellings and be able to use and spell these words in context correctly.
