#### Background and context - national

As part of the legacy plans following the London 2012 Olympics, every primary school has received funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision from the academic year 2013/14 onwards. You can find information about the PE and Sport premium here.

Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding to improve quality and breadth of PE and sport provision, including increasing participation in PE and sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels of which they are capable.

Ofsted will inspect, monitor and evaluate how this funding is spent and its impact both at national and school level.

#### Background, context and baseline – Christ Church Primary School

Features of our high-quality PE and sport provision. This is provision which was already in place prior to additional funding (12/13 academic year) and which remains in place and has been built on through plans below:

- High-quality PE teaching for all classes (Reception to Year 6) taught by specialist PE coach
- At least two hours of high-quality physical activity for all children
- Range of after school sport/physical activity clubs for both KS1 and KS2 (12/13 6 free clubs run by school staff and 6 charging clubs run by outside agencies)
- Participation in several Camden School Sports Association borough-wide competitions and events (2012/13: 4 competitions)
  - Support of individual pupils into borough/area sports teams and events
- Use of local amenities to enhance school sports facilities (Hampstead Heath, Swiss Cottage Swimming Baths, Royal Free Hospital Sports Hall)

There are five key indicators across which schools should expect to see improvement:

- 1. the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
- 2. the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. increased participation in competitive sport

These key indicators are referenced in our targets and implementation plan below.

# At Christ Church School we continue to target the use of the additional funding towards the following aims:

- To increase and then maintain the hours of high-quality, specialist PE teaching we offer across the school and the hours that our teachers spend learning from specialist PE coaches (key indicators 1,2,4)
- > To increase and then maintain the number of after school physical activity clubs we offer (including for the least active children in our school) (key indicators 1,2,4,5)
- To increase our use of Hampstead Heath and other local amenities for sports (key indicators 1,3,4,5)
- > To increase and then maintain our entries into borough-wide competitions, including the School Games (key indicators 4,5)
- > To develop the range of games and physical activity in our junior playground at break times (key indicators 1,2,4)

Each year between 2014-2019 Christ Church has been awarded a Sainsbury's School Games award (bronze, silver or gold) to recognise our participation in competitive sports. In 2020 and 2021 schools were not able to reapply for their school games award, but maintain their previous award for the year. The school was awarded a Gold School Games Award again in 2022 and in 2023.

This plan and our use of and the impact of the additional funding will continue to be monitored in school by the senior leadership team and the Teaching, Learning and Standards Governors Committee through our termly evaluations of our School Improvement Plan including through consultation with pupils, parents and staff.

### Sustainability

School staff members (teachers and TAs) are working alongside our specialist PE teacher during several of our additional timetabled PE sessions and sport clubs to develop their own skills as part of our professional development programme. In 2023/24 school staff (PE teacher, class teachers and TAs) will work alongside a dance specialist teacher to develop their dance skills. This will help to maintain our increased PE and physical activity provision if the current additional funding arrangements

change. Our increase in entries into borough-wide competitions has been organised jointly by school staff and our PE specialist so that the set up and coordination of these additional competitions can also continue if the current funding were to end.

## Reporting on the national curriculum requirement for swimming

From the 2017/18 academic year onwards, there is a new condition requiring schools to publish how many pupils within their year 6 cohort are meeting the national curriculum requirement to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres, use a range of strokes effectively and perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations.
